



Eternity Modern offers faux sheepskin and genuine sheepskin upholstery. Faux sheepskin is made of polyester and available in long and short hair lengths. Our genuine sheepskin, sustainably sourced from Australian Merino Crossbred Sheep, is treated with a frosted finish that creates natural variations in color and tone.

DUST & DEBRIS BUILDUP

Both faux sheepskin and genuine sheepskin have a higher pile than other types of fabric upholstery. This causes sheepskin to accumulate dust, dirt, debris, and crumbs more easily over time.

To prevent buildup, vacuum regularly with an upholstery attachment. Be sure to use plain suction as opposed to a rotating beater brush as this may cause damage to your sheepskin upholstery.

COMPRESSED & MATTED FIBERS

Sheepskin's naturally higher pile can cause fibers to become matted over time. The fibers may be compressed from being pushed in one direction. Oil and dirt can also cause the fibers to become tangled, stringy, or gather in clumps.

After removing dust and debris, use a wire brush (or a pet comb) and comb out the fibers. This will remove knots and help fluff up the fibers with air to reduce compression and matting.

CARING FOR SHEEPSKIN

To care for faux and genuine sheepskin, vacuum regularly using plain suction and avoid rotating beater brushes to prevent damage. Soak stains with water and clean with a mild, water-based cleaner using a damp sponge. Air dry and brush with a wire brush (or pet comb) after cleaning.

Take extra care with genuine sheepskin and avoid cleaning products containing chemicals, phosphates, bleach and enzymes. Always avoid direct sunlight to prevent color changes.
